Many Gather to Honor the Dead

Fraternal Lodges and War Veterans Held Impressive Decoration Day Sunday

Last Sunday afternoon Victoria Lodge No. 182, L.O.L., Court Goderich No. 32, C. O. F., and the Great War Veterans held their annual union decoration services at Maitland cemetery. The weather was ideal and there was a large gathering of town and country people as well as many visitors at the service held in memory of the departed. At 2:30 o'clock the various orders, headed by members of the Boy Scouts, marched from the Square to the cemetery. At the entrance to the cemetery the Goderich Citizens Band joined the procession, taking its position in front and leading the parade into the cemetery. Rev. R. C. McDermid was in charge of the service, which opened with the offering of prayer by Rev. J. Scott, of Fisherton. Two verses of the hymn, "Onward Christian Soldiers," were sung and then followed the Scripture reading by Rev. Mr. Scott. The hymn, "Nearer My God to Thee," was followed by an address by Rev. J. N. H. Mills. Mr. Mills gave an excellent address dealing with the real purpose of such a gathering. People were not gathered here today simply to place flowers on empty graves, but the true purpose of this service was to pay respect and honor to the memory of those who have passed on. The speaker, as we think of the lives of our departed ones, we should gather some encouragement and inspiration to carry on life's work for God. After the address the roll of the dead was read by members of the orders. Major A. F. Sturdy read the roll for the veterans, Mr. H. L. Leggett for the Orangemen and Mr. A. Hadden for the Foresters. The "Last Post" was sounded by Bandsman Robert Henry. After the singing of three verses of the hymn, "Abide With Me," the benediction was pronounced by Rev. Mr. Scott. The members of the lodges then proceeded to decorate the graves of their departed brethren.

Breaks Down as Sentence is Passed

Crown Witness, Mother of Family, Feels Keenly for Man Whom She Testifies Against

This (Thursday) morning at Clinton Gordon Mason, charged with breaking and entering, was given one year determinate and one year indeterminate in an Ontario reformatory. He entered the home of John McClure, Goderich township, and stole \$14; also the home of Mrs. Phillip Potter, in Goderich township, where he stole a wrist watch and \$4.25. The offences were committed two weeks ago. Mason is twenty-seven years of age. There was a dramatic touch to the court proceedings this morning when Mrs. Potter, a Crown witness, completely broke down when accused was sentenced. Given assistance and solace Mrs. Potter sobbed: "I was thinking of my own boys." Asked where he was born, Mason said he did not know—his father was dead. When sentence was passed accused remarked, "Why, they only give us three months for breaking our parole at Guelph." During the past few days there has been the usual grist of H. T. A. and L. C. A. cases throughout the county, also one case of insanity, one case of desertion of wife and family, using indecent language on highway, and assault. Tomorrow (Friday) Wellington Ronald of Listowel and Arthur Stephens of Gorrie face charges of abduction or taking a girl under sixteen from her parents' home in Gorrie and keeping her away two days.

OBITUARY

JOHN FRASER

Impressive funeral services were held on Tuesday afternoon for John Fraser, whose death occurred on Sunday, August 31, at Alexandra Marine and General Hospital, Goderich. The funeral took place from the home of Mrs. David Mellin, Newgate street, his place of residence, and was held under Masonic auspices, the war veterans, too, being well represented. Rev. R. C. McDermid, of Knox Presbyterian church, was in charge. The pallbearers were James Carrie, A. F. Sturdy, W. F. Saunders, Dr. Graham, Thomas Pritchard and J. H. Lander. Beautiful wreaths from the Masons, the Canadian Legion and the Maitland Golf Club rested on top of the casket, draped with the Union Jack. There were also many floral tokens from friends in Goderich and different parts of the Province, two from professional golfers in Toronto and Galt, who attended in person. The late John Fraser, who was in his forty-fifth year, was a native of Leith, Scotland, where his mother still resides. For the past three years he has acted as "pro" at the Maitland Golf Club, and was held in high esteem by members both as a golfer and gentleman. He was of a quiet, reserved nature and made few intimate friends. He served in the Great War in Mesopotamia with the Imperial forces, contracting rheumatic fever, from which he never fully recovered. Six weeks ago he was seized with a heart attack, from which he failed to rally. Interment was made in Maitland cemetery. The Toronto Star's sports editor makes the following reference to the deceased: "Many friends in Toronto will regret to learn of the death of John Fraser, professional at the Maitland Golf Club, Goderich, which occurred on Sunday after a brief illness. Mr. Fraser came to Canada from Edinburgh about five years ago. For two years he was head salesman in the Golf Department of the T. Eaton Co., but his inclination was toward the golf professional's shop and two years ago he received the appointment at Goderich. He spent last winter with a golf club in California but returned to resume his duties at Goderich early in the present season. Two weeks ago Fraser was taken seriously ill from heart trouble and despite the best of hospital care grew weaker until he passed away. The deceased was a quiet, gentlemanly, rather sensitive young Scotsman who made friends wherever he went. He was a good golfer and a painstaking teacher. He was also the possessor of a very fine penit voice and frequently sang at concerts at Hollywood. Hardships in the war, through which he served with a Scottish regiment, are said to have been responsible for the heart condition which terminated his life."

Chairman's Vote Has Been Protested

G. B. Davies is Chosen Director of Music, but Appointment is Challenged

G. B. Davies was tonight appointed director of music for Goderich public schools, but the appointment is by no means certain. There was a tie vote, three for W. B. Rothwell and two for G. B. Davies. Chairman Parsons claimed the privilege of casting two votes, one to create a tie and one as chairman to break the tie, both votes going to Mr. Davies. These votes were cast under strenuous protest of Mr. Rothwell's supporters.

Session on Labor Day
 Although it was Labor Day the public school board met also Monday evening to consider, among other things, the appointment of an instructor of music, but without coming to a decision. Two resolutions resulted in a tie and both were declared lost by the chairman. The question was discussed a considerable length. When the meeting adjourned the three applicants, W. B. Rothwell, G. B. Davies and A. W. Anderton all being very much in the running. A letter was read from the Women's Institute stating that the annual grant of \$100 would be continued if an appointment was made. Those present Monday were Chairman Parsons and Trustees Wallace, Carrie, Miller and Thomson.

Coal Contract Awarded
 The contract for forty tons of coal for Central school was awarded to J. B. Mustard. The coal, No. 1 anthracite, is to be weighed on the town scales and delivered at \$14.25 a ton. There were four tenders, two being at the same price.

Mr. A. C. Jackson, caretaker of Central school, was granted \$25 increase in salary, commencing with this term. He applied for an increase of \$50.

A report from an insurance company informed the board that Central school furnace firebox was in need of repairs. It was ordered done at once.
