Dr. Melamed upholds Jesus against an attack by the Rev. John Haynes Holmes, pastor of the Christian Community Church of New York City. Dr. Holmes, a Christian minister

said in a recent sermon that the "re igion of the future will have nothing o do with Jesus. It will have no use for the Bible or for any church. It will be based on truth only, truth as found by man and not as revealed by

There are many anti-Caesars to-day. There were many anti-Caesars, one, two, or 500 years ago, but Jesus of Nazareth, the humble Jew, was the first anti-Caesar in

history. As a reward, he was ele-vated to the position of the Son of God—the highest reward ever re-ceived by a mortal for a great mortal feat. The reward killed Jesus for the Jews. He is not acceptable to us and never will be. Jewish monotheism rejects not only doctrines but even symbols liable to becloud its purity.

New Orientation of the British View of the "Danger Spot"

According to the Herald Tribune' dispatches from London the British government as actively debating the proposal to transfer the main "strik-ing force" of the British Army from England to ndia. There are reports of the Russians massing their sions across the northwest frontier and flinging a strategic railway into Afghanistan. after 1900 the British government called home its warships to the North Sea and settled down to the naval competition with Germany which was to end in the World War, Through those years it was no longer a que tion of pushing the Empire upon its broders, but of defending it at its very centre. The next war would be across the North Sea and the army would fight in Flanders if not upon home territory. But after Versailles the wheel turned again. The British battle fleet was based in the Mediterranean, for the German menace was gone. The naval base was built at Singapore, and now if the Empire be regarded as a whole in the changed world of to-day it might easily seem logical to concentrate its military defence in India, close to Turkey and the Near East, close to Mesopota and oil. close to China and Australia. The "Shanghai defence force," which had to be started so long before any actual need for it was proved, becaus it took so long to get from Southamp ton to the Yangtze, must have given British strategists a good deal to think of.

Consequently, a transfer of the British army to India might not mean war with Russia any more than transfer of our battle fleet to the Pa cific meant war with Japan.
